# Minister's Letter

# Church of St Giles' and St Columba's South

#### Dear all,

We are approaching the end of September and I must confess that it was a roller coaster of a month. At first a new Prime Minister was confirmed by The Queen, just for us to sadly learn 48 hours later that she had died at Balmoral. These moments touched our lives in various ways. St Giles' played a pivotal role in helping our community deal with the grief and allowing a safe space for people to share their memories of the late Queen. A huge thank you to all the volunteers who helped us during the ten days of mourning as people came to sign the Book of Condolence. We have heard from the Council that the Book of Condolence will be saved in a digital format and the original will be sent to the Royal Household.

Sitting in St Giles' during this time offered me the opportunity to engage with a lot of people passing through the door. Stories were shared of how people remembered The Queen, but also allowed people to share their own stories of Elgin. It also allowed people to speak about faith, a conversation that was encourage by The Queen's own faith. What struck me was the fellowship and community we shared together. Families came in with children, grandparents came in with grandchildren or groups of teenagers, all sharing their grief and making sense of this occasion on their own terms. It is here where we find the story of Christ intersecting with our story. When we are at a low ebb or in the worst of times, we sometimes find Christ right there waiting for us.

In John 4, one of my favourite stories in the Bible, Jesus waits at the well for the Samaritan women. At first, he asks for something simple, a bit of water. A conversation starts to develop, until the story of how Jesus the Messiah intersects with this woman, who I might add, had some virtues which could be frowned upon in some circles. Here we find the King of creation speaking to a woman who would have had no standing or regard in her community. Jesus changed her story. From being, perhaps a bitter outcast, she is transformed by the story of Jesus to being someone who brought the Good News to her village. We read in John 4: 39 – 41: *"Many of the Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony, "He told me everything I ever did." So when the Samaritans came to him, they urged him to stay with them, and he stayed two days. And because of his words many more became believers."* 

Let us be inspired by this story of hope. As we continue our own journey with Christ, may we continue to look out for those moments where we are surprised and inspired by the story of God. As we continue our journey as God's people, may we know that His presence will always be there to inspire us to listen to each other, love one another and care for His creation.

#### **Eco-Congregation**

Last month we were asked to start having conversations with friends and family as part of the ongoing climate change conversations to coincide with Scotland's Climate Change Week. The last theme was on energy efficiency, reducing emissions and reducing energy bills. This month's conversation theme is 'Eating for a Greener World'. We can probably all make an attempt at working out what not to eat if we're told to eat a low fat or low sugar diet but the idea of eating a diet for the good of the planet may seem far more complicated. Being asked to reduce the amount of meat and increase plant based foods meets a variety of responses, not all positive. Food waste is also a huge problem in Scotland. Finding creative ways to use leftovers becomes important.

Conversation starters.

1. Have you made changes to the way you eat to be more environmentally friendly? If so, what did you find easy or difficult?

2. How do you feel when you are confronted with unfamiliar foods or new recipes to cook?

3. Do you plan menus before going shopping?

4. What do you do with leftover food?

How about swapping recipes for using up leftovers.

The Green Christian website has a saying- Use Your LOAF. The letters stand for: Locally produced, Organically produced, Animal friendly, Fairly traded.

Exodus 16 tells the story about the grumbling Israelites and how God provided for them, enough for their needs.

Some greedy Israelites tried to hoard food but it spoiled.

We too need to make sure we use only what we need of the world's food supplies and not be so greedy that we have too much and up throwing away good food.

The Organic Soil Association website tells us what difference organic farming can make. Eating locally grown food saves on carbon from transport. Fairtrade aims to ensure the producer is given the correct payment.

I hope to put out some Climate Conversation Starters leaflets for people to think about.

#### World Mission news

## PARTNER organisations and churches overseas have offered condolences to the Church of Scotland following the death of Queen Elizabeth.

In a letter to Church staff, Dr Bernard Sabella of the Department of Services to Palestinian Refugees of the Middle East Council of Churches said they had been following the cortege.

He wrote: "On this sad occasion to many in Scotland, we wanted in DSPR/MECC to pay our respect to her memory and long reign," adding: "As a person, she was a model for civility, yearning for peace and reconciliation."

Reflecting on a personal memory, he said he treasured a meeting with the Queen at Windsor Royal Chapel during his attendance at a conference on peace and reconciliation.

"I have also followed King Charles III's statements on support to the Church of Scotland and I certainly see this as quite positive considering that our world needs more openness to others based on our different religious and faith backgrounds. The tradition that I have seen at the annual General Assemblies of the Church of Scotland and that I attended on behalf of the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees of the Middle East Council of Churches always impressed me with the Royal Address to the Church Assembly. This, for me, was an occasion in which the Head of the Nation addresses issues implicated in the values that a faith community, the Church of Scotland, upholds.

"This mixture of royalty and church remains poignant particularly at a time when political systems appear to be far off the issues and values that invigorate faith and its practice across our world."

He added: "Let me end by once again offer our respect for the passing of Queen Elizabeth II and to wish well for King Charles III and the country, irrespective of geography, national original, ethnic and religious backgrounds."

Condolences were also expressed by Dr Annette Kurschus of the Evangelical Church of Westphalia in Germany who wrote: "With sorrow and intercession we stand with the British people and the Church of Scotland in these hours and share your grief for HM Queen Elizabeth II. God blessed her with a long reign and allowed peace to grow between our countries during this time.

"We have found this to be a great gift after the times of the Second World War, in which we inflicted such deep wounds on your country. The Queen also reached out to us Christians and the churches in Germany so that reconciliation between our peoples could become a reality. We are grateful to her for this."

Rita Famos offered condolences from Switzerland: "The Protestant Church in Switzerland would like to extend its deepest sympathies to the Church of England, the Church of Scotland, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland and the Presbyterian Church of Wales in the loss of their inspirational, comforting and faithful Queen."

"Our hearts go out to the church members, to the Royal Family and to all who will miss Queen Elizabeth II. May the God she so trusted comfort and strengthen you for all of the challenges that lie ahead." In October our Church has a Harvest Thanksgiving Service to



celebrate another successful year of growth throughout the countryside. Our Church will be decorated with flowers, fruit and vegetables with tinned and dried goods being collected and displayed. After the service all that has been brought to the church will be given to those in the area who needs these items for healthy living and survival.

Harvest is a wonderful time. It is a time when we come to church and say 'thank you' to God for all the good things he has given us. Some people think that harvest is only about food but it is much more than that. At harvest we do say 'thank you' to God but we do it for many reasons. Let's think about the letters in the word

# HARVEST

#### H stands for our HOMES.

Homes that are warm and clean and comfortable. Homes where we can be part of a loving family, where we feel safe and cared for.

#### **R stands for RECREATION**

That's a big word meaning our free time when we play games, go on holidays, have fun and enjoy ourselves.

#### V stands for VEGETABLES

We may not always like eating green cabbage but we have lots of fruit and vegetables to enjoy. Look around as you shop with Mum and you will see apples and bananas, carrots and cabbage, and many, many more varieties.

#### **E stands for EDUCATION**

You could read and spell the word HARVEST because you have been to school and learnt to read. We enjoy many things in our lives because of our education-which has taught us to read, write and understand numbers.

#### T stands for THANKS

At harvest we should come to say a big 'thank you' to God for all the wonderful things that he gives us-our homes, our families, our friends, our recreation, our food and our education.


So that's what some of our letters stand for. But H, R, V, E, T don't spell harvest. There are two letters missing.
