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Minister's Letter

Church of St Giles' and St Columba's South

Dear all,

I hope this letter finds you well and that you have enjoyed, like ourselves, the wonderful summer weather. Arriving back from South Africa, we were surprised by the abundance of fruit and vegetables in our garden, a sign of a pleasant, perhaps even, a too hot summer. As harvest approaches, we'll have to get ready to hand out a few bags of apples!

Our trip to South Africa was as successful as could be. We managed to get my Mum into a nursing facility in July and are happy to say that there has been a tremendous improvement to her health. We hope that she will soon be able to move to more independent living, however, still in the care home but with more freedom to be enjoyed. We would like to thank you all for keeping us in your thoughts and prayers.

On arriving in South Africa and as we were driving from the airport to their home, my Father – in - law turned to me and asked: "When do you know that somebody is driving under the influence?". In general, the answer would be when the person is not driving straight in the car lane. His reply was, "well a drunk person drives straight and a sober person tries to miss the potholes". This still makes me chuckle when I think about some of the potholes we managed to miss on the roads. However, sometimes, even with the best of manoeuvres, you had to pass through the pothole. This image stuck with me as we travel through the difficult journey of Presbytery planning. Even with the best of manoeuvres and planning, you can't miss all the potholes, all the time.

One of these potholes was created by the General Trustees (the property holding arm of the Church of Scotland) when they advised that only one building should be retained in Elgin with the choice being between St Giles' and the site of St Columba's South. There is no easy answer, especially when the advice is to change St Columba's from pews to a more modern interior. Despite the best of manoeuvres, you sometimes can't help but hit a pothole. The question is, how do we deal with this? Do we get despondent and get ready for the end, or do we with logic and vision engage with the problem? I would hope that we would choose the latter. Elijah, after beating the Baal prophets to show the real power of God in front of Ahab, fled into the desert after it become known that Jezebel wanted to kill him. We read that in the wilderness and under a broom bush (1 Kings 19: 4-5), the man who managed to miss all the potholes hit rock bottom when he declared:"I have had enough, Lord". This still didn't stop God doing great things through Elijah. God takes our potholes, our fears and anger, and is able in the quietness of loneliness to give us back the energy and zeal that we need to bring the Good News. On the mountain, God sent Elijah back to continue his journey. I am of the firm belief that God is also instructing us to continue our journey of faith, despite the potholes.

May we find comfort in the presence of a God that seeks us from under broom bushes and deserts to follow Him each and every day. This is the church and family of which we are part of, even when the road is sometimes a wee bit rocky.

Laich of Moray Bus


The bus brings folks to Church on Sundays, at least once a month

Moray Eco-Congregation group is planning to organise a prayerful afternoon walk starting at 2pm at the Grant Park car park, off Victoria Road, Forres, on 22nd September. These walks are always interesting and very sociable as well as prayerful and it will take place around the Season of Creation. All very welcome.

Eco-tip

All used ball point pens can be disposed of in a container in WH Smith, Elgin, near the card section.

All unwanted computer equipment, printers, mobile phones, plugs and leads, accessories can be collected for recycling by ReBoot, Forres. Tel. 01309 671681. Secure data wiping can be arranged but make sure you really want to recycle the item. The data wiping process cannot be reversed. The recycled equipment and parts can then be sold to pay for the running of the business now that the council grant for ReBoot has ceased. Much of the work is done by volunteers

With the expected horrendous rise in energy costs some people may be eligible for help with home insulation or replacement heating systems through homeenergyscotland.org or tel. 0808 808 2282. The help comes through loans which have a five year repayment period and/or grants funded by the Scottish Government and it comes under Net Zero Scotland. An online form is available for initial enquiries or just make a phone call.

Eco-Congregation is keen for all eco-congregations to hold Climate Conversations during the period which includes Scotland's Climate Week from September 26th. This year after soaring temperatures, fires, floods, high winds and changing weather patterns world wide we must all be aware of how the climate crisis is impacting countries around the world. Action is required now and the world cannot afford more procrastination.

Scottish Government's Net Zero Scotland is asking us all to have conversations with friends, families and colleagues to help create a ripple effect of positive action. No one should be blamed, judged, attacked or criticised and people are asked to be mindful of where people are coming from - economically, societally and emotionally. By 2030 Scotland should have enough off shore wind to power 8 million homes. At present a fifth of Scotland's total greenhouse emissions come from our homes and buildings and they come from burning gas or oil. Only 11% of households have a renewable energy heating system.

Here are some questions we can start asking one another.

- 1. What is the relationship between improving energy efficiency, reducing emissions and reducing energy bills?
- 2. How can we improve our own home energy efficiency?
- 3. Can we improve our insulation and install a heat pump or modern storage heaters.
- 4. Can we use smart meters or a room thermostat to better control heating?
- 5. How can we afford to make these changes when bills are increasing so quickly?

I expect that during Climate Week there will be quite a bit of information about the subject on television and other news outlets. Let us hope there will be some positive news. We will also be asked to discuss waste, nature, transport, food and climate change itself. Eco-Congregation Scotland wanted us to talk about holidays for the month of August. Should we still fly or take a cruise? Should we holiday nearer home? Can we really off set our travel journeys? Should they be rationed?

So many questions. No easy answers.

World Mission News

United Mission to Nepal celebrates project agreements

Our partners at United Mission to Nepal (UMN) have written to tell us that they have signed two project agreements, which will allow them to carry forward their work for the next five years, with a vision of fullness of life for all.

All their project agreements have been delayed for up to two years, with the Covid-19 pandemic, changes in politics and transitions within the Social Welfare Council panel all having an impact on the process.

Dhana Lama, UMN's Executive Director, wrote to us with the following message: "Thank you once again for continuous prayers and support to UMN. Finally, we made it and celebrated. God is very faithful and good."

We help presbyteries and congregations identify ways to work with both local organisations and the world church on issues that impact the wider world as well as those closer to home.

Our work includes providing support for Twinning, Mission partners, Interfaith discussions and cooperation, Study visits and pilgrimages, which enable people of all ages and experience to learn from partners around the world.

We are committed to supporting General Assembly decisions on social justice and the pursuit of a fairer, more ethical world by campaigning for gender and racial justice, help for refugees, democracy, education, and ending poverty. As part of our work on climate change, we will help develop a strategy for the Church to transition to net zero carbon emissions by 2030.
